



Crewe's Royal Visits and Coronation Celebrations

Platinum Jubilee

In February 2022, Queen Elizabeth II celebrated her Platinum Jubilee after becoming Queen of the United Kingdom and other Commonwealth countries in February 1952.

A Platinum Jubilee is the celebration of the 70th year as a reigning Monarch.

This year, Crewe is celebrating it's 185 year history which started with Crewe Station opening on the 4th July 1937.

This was just 2 weeks after Queen Victoria became Queen on the 20th June 1837.

In these 185 years of Crewe existing, there have been a total of 6 Monarchs on the throne.

One of these Monarchs, Queen Elizabeth II, will be the first to celebrate their Platinum Jubilee and has become the longest reigning Monarch in British history.

This also means it is the first Platinum Jubilee ever in British history!

Her Platinum Jubilee will be officially celebrated on the 2nd June-5th June. This is when there will be a special bank holiday weekend where people will celebrate.

All over the country, there will be people celebrating with dances, parades, pageants and parties!

Decorations

In the past, the people of Crewe have welcomed Royal visitors to the town and celebrated Coronations and Jubilees by displaying bunting in the streets and in shops and houses.

A Coronation is when someone officially becomes the King or Queen!

On the 22nd June 1911, King George V was officially Coronated. He was the Grandfather to our current Queen Elizabeth II. Bunting was displayed by all the shops and Crewe Municipal Buildings were covered in 500 fairy lights.

Children also waved flags and banners in the street.

On the 21st April 1913, King George V and Queen Mary visited Crewe. They were met at the train station with flags and streamers waved by the people of Crewe.



Design and make your own Royal Bunting

You've just examined pictures which showed how people celebrated Coronations in Crewe in the past.

Did you notice the bunting?


Bunting has traditionally been used in the UK to decorate streets and houses to celebrate different events- the end of the war, royal coronations and summer parties.

Bunting is in the shape of a triangle.

Let's try designing and making our own bunting.



- Try and show off your creativity!
- What story do you want your bunting to show?
- Where will you get your inspiration from?
- Will your bunting be colourful?
- Will your bunting have a pattern?
- What reaction do you want to get from people when they see your bunting?




Start by printing out the bunting template on A3 or A2 paper. You can use either of the templates or both. You might want to print them on card.





Cut the shape out with scissors. You can decide if you want to keep the outline or not.



You might want to practice your design first and think about your colours, patterns and designs you want to feature on your bunting.

WHAT WILL YOU NEED

Bunting templates

Paper

Pens and colouring pencils


Scissors

String or ribbon

Pencil

Rubber

Tape



When you feel comfortable with your design, you can begin to draw your designs onto your bunting.



You can cut smaller triangles out of the template if you want too.




Turn your triangle over and fold over the top part.



Turn your triangle over and fold over the top part. Secure in place with tape.



Hang your bunting somewhere for everyone to see!



Street Parties

In the past, people in Crewe have had street parties to celebrate Royal visits, Coronations and Jubilees.

King George VI was officially coronated in 1937. He was Queen Elizabeth II's father. People celebrated by holding tea parties at school and in the street and having a competition for the best decorated party! The Crewe Chronicle in 1937 commented that "few towns of its size and character celebrated the Coronation more loyally than Crewe. The entire population gave itself to rejoicing."

When Queen Elizabeth II was officially Coronated in June 1953, people in Crewe had tea parties on the street with sandwiches, jellies and ice cream!

A Royal Welcome

People in Crewe have welcomed Royal visits in different ways in the past.

King George V and Queen Mary visited Crewe in April 1913 and they were welcomed with people lining the streets on their way to visit Crewe Works, The Webb Orphanage and the Railway Hospital. They were met by Foden's Band who played the National Anthem.

King George VI and the Queen Mother visited Crewe in 1940 along with the then Princess Elizabeth, who was visiting Crewe for the first time. It was 1 year into World War 2 and it was a strange and uncertain time for Britain. The trip was part of a wider country tour to boost the country's morale and give encouragement. They were welcomed by people at Crewe Alexandra as well as the Rolls- Royce shadow factory where they observed engineers making Merlin engines for war planes. Most of the workers there were women and the Queen was interested in their work. They were greeted by Foden's Band who played songs for them.

Queen Elizabeth II has also visited Crewe a number of different times as the reigning Monarch. She visited in 1977 and took a look around Leighton Hospital as well as in 1987, opening the Crewe Heritage Centre. She was welcomed at the station by the people of Crewe waving flags and banners.





THE DECORATIONS. In addition to the main streets of the town, many of the side streets were very prettily decorated. There was hardly a business house or a private residence without some decorative display. High-street, which lends itself to the art of decorations more than most of the thoroughfares, was most attractive, and the streamers from either sides of the road produced a pretty effect. In Enton-street streamers of flags spanned the thoroughfare along the entrance to the Works. The L. and N.W. Rly. Co.'s offices on Chester Bridge were exquisitely decorated, and had as a centre piece the initials of the King and Queen. Various coloured electric lights illuminated the decorations in the evening and provided a very pretty spectacle. Coppenhall-terrace with its crescent of trees was also a scene of much colour, and the shopkespers vied with one another in producing the most effective display. The Mayor's residence had not been overlooked. In the trees were fairy lamps, and these were very pretty with the reflection of illuminations. The Manchester, Liverpoo! and District Bank wore its loyal garb of flags and streamers, and turning round into Earle-street, the Municipal Offices came in for admiration. In the centre of the decorations were handsome pictures of the King and Queen, and Mr. H. H. Denton, the borough electrical engineer, had very tastefully arranged the electrical illuminations. They reflected great credit upon him and his assistant, Mr. Hooley. At night the building with its different coloured lights presented a pleasing spectacle. Victoriastreet was not behind in its manifestations of loyalty, and the cecorations were most elaborate. The same remark applied to Hightown and West.

street. Coming back to the Co-operative Society's establishment in Market-street, there were hundreds of small flags festooned across from their various departments and electric lights were everywhere displayed. Among the other principal thoroughfares tastefully decorated were Nartwich-road, Mill-street, and Edleston-road. The Police Statior in Edleston-road compared favourably with any of the public buildings of the town in the matter of decoration, and looked exceedingly neat and pretty, a large photo of the King being surrounded with evergreens. Last but not least was the brave show of flags and etreamers along Wistaston-road and Victoriaavenue to the Queen's Park. The Park entrance was rich in its show of streamers and other decorative material. It is many years since the town looked so pretty. The Royal Hotel and Parr's Bank were profusely tedecked with streamers, and in many of the streets were congratulatory a ettees and photos of the King and Queen.
